



## 1930s Pavilion, St Edward's School, Oxford

A classical 1930s cricket pavilion at one of the UK's leading independent schools has been restored to its former glory using a combination of products from the PAREX Render Systems and Façade Solutions range.



The pavilion at St Edward's School, Oxford, was in need of a facelift after years of use by the school teams.

Regular contractor to the school Kevin O'Dougan Construction of Stanford in the Vale, entrusted the external refurbishment work to ACH Plastering, of Standlake, Witney, Oxfordshire, who removed the existing sand-cement render and re-rendered the whole structure using PAREX materials.



Some 280 m<sup>2</sup> of the existing painted render was removed prior to application of a preparatory bonding coat of lime-based PAREX Parinter Renovation with TV10 reinforcing mesh embedded for added strength and anti-crack properties.

The finishing coat of PAREX bright white, Blanc du Littoral, was hand applied by ACH then given a traditional scratched finish to re-create the original appearance of the pavilion, which serves as a gymnasium and changing rooms for the school.

The building, resplendent with period clock tower, stands close by another award winning architect-designed pavilion building which was constructed in 2010 and has won wide critical acclaim.
